For 21 years now—all spent in New Haven, Connecticut—I have told countless folk about Lake Shore Baptist Church of Waco, Texas, and how perfectly matched the church and this church member were at that time. I was at that moment in my spiritual life exactly where Lake Shore was at that moment in its spiritual life. Roger Paynter, Sharlande Sledge, Libby Bellinger, and Jeff Zurheide were my friends, colleagues, mentors, and examples in church ministry, and I finally yielded to the call of clergy ordination under their guidance. Since finishing seminary in 1982, I had resisted ordination as an act that would restrict me and require me to be someone other than myself. I thought too intensely about it all and thought that the floor beneath me would open up and swallow me whole if I submitted to the laying on of hands. I joined Lake Shore in 1983, and in 1986, the church asked me to serve as a deacon. The service of ordination to the diaconate was a beautifully affirming moment in my life, and a true confirmation from God and God's people as to where I was to invest my time and energy in the years ahead. And the floor of Lake Shore Baptist Church did not open up and swallow me whole that Sunday morning! Instead, the foundation beneath me was strengthened and made much easier to walk upon.

In 1987, I was ordained to the ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ by the very good folk of Lake Shore. In 1988, I moved to New Haven and Yale University where I have been in ministry of one form and another ever since. I serve as the Dean of Students for Yale Divinity School, and I serve as a member of the clergy with the American Baptist Churches of Connecticut. Thank you, Lake Shore, for all you were for me at a critical point in my life. I am very, very grateful. Happy Anniversary!

Carolyn took us to San Antonio to sleep on the floor and work in the soup kitchens and clothes closet. Pretty fun stuff until she said she needed me to go work the homeless shelter and stay all night. I finally forgave her but I will never forget learning the difference between my prayers and Winnie’s, the shelter director’s real prayers — like the one she started, “God, thank you for letting us live to see another day.” Whew! I had to work really hard on my Lake Shore singing—we are all children of the Lord, indeed.

Watching Sharlande take my children (and all our children) and bring all the Lake Shore songs to life for them with mission work and helping hands and building bridges everywhere; with starry nights and stone soup and faithful friends was gift beyond price. And so I learned more about faith and loyalty and perseverance and the width and breadth of God’s love for us. I learned about the opportunities that are ours to savor that love and then send it forth “with our whole hearts.”

Yes, that is my favorite Lake Shore song and to my great delight it has become our favorite Calder song as well. That was always and will always be the great beacon that is Lake Shore. I wish I had socks," and then she proceeded to take off her shoes and walk into the service barefooted.

Andrew marched into church with his head held high, and I walked in having learned another lesson about what being church is all about from the loving people here at Lake Shore.

For almost twenty-five years you have graciously tolerated my creative distractions, followed me through subway tunnels when I wasn't really sure where I was going, trusted me with your children's questions about God and their safety when we traveled, humbled me with calls to walk with you through the "deep waters," kept my storytelling gene alive, showed me community on retreats and mission trips, loved me from brown hair all the way to silver, and given me an open mike to talk about countries, people, and foods I love. You've embraced the Whimsy in my life!

You've shaped me by polishing a few of my many rough edges and adding texture to those that were too smooth. You've shaped my motion into poetry. You taught me to take the gospel seriously and myself, not so seriously. As a community you do *your* part in keeping me grounded in the center of God's love and kindness, and you keep encouraging me to do mine.

Once, many years ago on a plane, I read Eugene Peterson's wise words about staying in a local congregation for a long time, long enough to see several generations of children grow up, to get the feel for a place, to see the results of decisions and dreams lived out over time.
